Is This A "Sound" Church?

Is the Airport congregation a "sound" church? Before we can accurately answer such a question, we need to know what the word "sound" means to the asker. Since I asked the question, I will explain it – Is this church "sound" according to the Bible definition of the word "sound"? This sermon will help us to determine if this congregation is scripturally "sound"...

BIBLICAL USAGE

The Greek word translated into English as "sound" means "to be healthy", i.e., to be "sound in health" [AN EXPOSITORY DICTIONARY OF NEW TESTAMENT WORDS by W. E. Vine].

It was used to depict one who was physically healthy – "safe and sound" (Luke 15:25-27).

It was used to describe things that were/are spiritually healthy – "sound doctrine" (1 Timothy 1:5-11; 2 Timothy 4:2-4; Titus 1:7-9; 2:1); "sound words" (2 Timothy 1:13); "sound speech" (Titus 2:6-8); "sound in faith" (Titus 2:1-2); "sound in the faith" (Titus 1:13).

HUMAN VIEWPOINT

During the past 5 or 10 years, it seems to me that the word "sound" has been replaced by the term "conservative" in the vocabulary of some Christians. Today, when these brethren ask a question about a congregation, they are more likely to ask whether it is "conservative" rather than ask if it is "sound".

The word "conservative" is a relative term. Suppose that Congregation A does 10 things without Bible authority, but Congregation B does only 5 things without Bible authority. Compared to Congregation A, Congregation B is "conservative"; but, is it "sound"? When did the word "conservative" become a synonym for the word "righteous"? It is possible for a local church to be "conservative" and still <u>not</u> be righteous – still <u>not</u> be "sound"!

Many "conservative" Christians tend to judge the soundness of a local church solely by what it does <u>not</u> do. Therefore, if a church does <u>not</u> have a kitchen or a "fellowship hall", does <u>not</u> operate a school/business, does <u>not</u> provide entertainment/recreation, does <u>not</u> participate in sponsoring-church arrangements, does <u>not</u> send financial support to human institutions, etc., then that church is viewed by them as being "conservative"/"sound".

It is true that a scripturally-sound church will <u>not</u> do any of those things – <u>no</u> Bible authority for such practices. However, neither individuals (Luke 18:9-14) nor congregations (Revelation 2:1-7) are scripturally sound [spiritually healthy] solely on the basis of what they do <u>not</u> do!

DIVINE VIEWPOINT

God's view of congregational soundness includes what a local church <u>does</u> as well as what it <u>does not</u> do (Revelation 3:7-13).

The Bible teaches that a scripturally-sound [spiritually-healthy] local church is characterized by the avoidance of lawlessness <u>and</u> the practice of righteousness (Psalms 34:11-14; 1 Thessalonians 5:21-22; 1 John 3:7).

Is our goal for this church to be "conservative" or to be "righteous"? Are we [individually and collectively] trying to avoid all lawlessness and to practice all righteousness? If so, then the Airport congregation <u>is</u> a scripturally-sound church!
